Report on Koel's Open House Presentation

The summer holiday showcasing was a lively and enriching event that gave children the opportunity to present the projects they had prepared with their families during the summer break. Each child selected the activities from one of three fascinating fields—Astronomy, Botany, and Zoology—and worked on an assignment that reflected their interests.

Before the main event, children first presented these activities in class during a show and tell session, which helped them gain confidence in speaking. They also participated in a mock presentation with other teachers to get a feel for the experience.

To create an immersive experience, the classrooms were transformed into theme-based spaces- for Astronomers, Botanists, and Zoologists.







Astronomers' Corner

In the Astronomers' room, young space enthusiasts spoke with excitement about their science experiments, the wonders of the solar system, and their favourite planets. Some children introduced imaginary planets with unique features and creative names, while others discussed interesting facts about celestial bodies. Storytelling was woven into their presentations—many narrated stories about space, stars, and planets, some used puppets to add fun and expression. Their stories included adventures of astronauts exploring distant galaxies, life on make-believe planets, and exciting space journeys. Models, drawings, and concept maps supported their talks, enabling them explain their ideas clearly and confidently.







Botanists' Gallery

The Botanists' classroom was filled with the charm of nature. Children described different trees they had observed during holidays and shared why certain trees were their favourites. They presented concept maps detailing tree types and their characteristics. Their creativity bloomed in the activity where they presented an imaginary tree having special powers, colours, or shapes, and adventurous imaginary treks where they discovered these magical plants.

Storytelling was an integral part of their presentations—many narrated plant and tree-related tales, such as *The Giving Tree*, using voice modulation and expressions to convey the message of care, generosity, and the beauty of nature.







Zoologists' Den

The Zoologists' section celebrated the animal kingdom. Children shared information about animals they had observed during holidays. They explained their chosen animal's living and eating habits, and presented concept maps showcasing their research. To bring their topic to life, they narrated animal-themed stories such as The Gruffalo's child. They showed their creativity by taking the audience on imaginary safaris filled with exciting encounters and playful characters. Props, models, and expressive voices enriched their presentations, making the experience both educational and entertaining.









They shared what they enjoyed doing the most—from making models and drawings to speaking about their favourite topics and telling stories, and discussed what they found challenging, such as remembering facts, speaking loudly, or explaining in detail. This reflective practice helped them become more aware of their strengths and areas for growth.
